In groups of 3-4:

Each group has been assigned two stanzas:

- rephrase the content of the stanzas in your own words in detail
- explain in detail what goes on in the stanzas
- pick a quote a line or two that says something significant. Explain it.
- Read out and comment your two stanzas in class.

General questions:

- what words can you use to describe this poem?
 - epic (: An extended narrative poem in elevated or dignified language, celebrating the feats of a legendary or traditional hero)
 - lyric (: expresses subjective thoughts and feelings)
 - romantic (Romanticism: Literary, artistic, and philosophical movement that began in Europe in the 18th century and lasted roughly until the mid-19th century. Romanticism emphasized the individual, the subjective, the irrational, the imaginative, the personal, the spontaneous and the emotional. Among its attitudes were a deepened appreciation of the beauties of nature; a general exaltation of emotion over reason and of the senses over intellect; a preoccupation with the genius, the hero, and the exceptional figure; a consuming interest in folk culture, national and ethnic cultural origins, and the medieval era; and a predilection for the exotic, the remote, the mysterious, the weird, the occult, the monstrous, the diseased, and even the satanic)
 - dramatic (: impressive, sudden and often surprising; exciting; connected with drama:
 A prose or verse composition, especially one telling a serious story, that is intended for representation by actors impersonating the characters and performing the dialogue and action.)
 - sensitive
 - **sentimental** (: Characterized or swayed by sentiment; affectedly or extravagantly emotional; resulting from or colored by emotion rather than reason or realism; appealing to the sentiments, especially to romantic feelings: sentimental music)
